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## Overview

During the 2023-2024 term of our Patient and Family Advisory (PFA) Program, our almost 90 Advisors have accomplished great work. This report outlines their involvement in various projects, activities, and events completed by our overall pool of Advisors, as well as by each of the five Patient and Family Advisory Councils (PFACs), representing the following areas:

## **Engagement Spotlights**

## Leadership Interview Panel Training

Advisors are invited to Leadership Interview Panels to provide feedback from a patient and/or patient family member perspective during the evaluation of interviewees. Leadership Interview Panels are typically utilized for Leadership positions such as Supervisors and above.

#### The 2023-24 Training Sessions:

- Two training sessions were hosted this term, one in the fall and one in the spring.
- These sessions were led by Liz Audette, Human Resources Consultant, with assistance from Rosanna Naslovar, Manager of Recruitment and Retention.
- Six advisors and two additional staff members attended the training sessions.

#### Training Content:

- The training outlines the SAH interview process and sets expectations for advisors participating in leadership interview panels.
- Advisors receive a "Leadership Interview Panel Training Cheat Sheet," which summarizes the key takeaways from the training.

#### Advisor Engagement & Future Opportunities:

- 17 Ad-Hoc Requests were submitted for Advisor to be a part of Leadership Interview Panels
- Advisors who wish to participate in Leadership Interview Panels are strongly encouraged to attend this training.
- Leadership interview training opportunities will be available again in Fall 2024.



## Coffee Chats with Ila Watson

- Ila Watson, President and CEO of Sault Area Hospital, hosted three Coffee Chat forums with patient and family advisors. These forums were held in October 2023, January and April 2024.
- Advisors were able to submit specific questions in advance, which IIa reviewed and answered during the sessions.
- Ila provided updates on the current status of SAH and discussed the challenges facing the organization. Advisors were encouraged to openly share their concerns and feedback.

- In July 2023, two of our ADCP Advisors collaborated with various ADCP and Northeast Cancer Centre (NECC) stakeholders to develop and create a communication plan for patients and the community regarding the replacement of the current SAH Radiation Treatment Unit.
- Advisor Led Rounding is a practice where patients can speak to peers about their experiences to help leadership make improvements. After the past success of the program in Ambulatory Care, we will be reinitiating the program in ADCP as well as in RENAL over the summer.



- Advisors are also working on identifying possible options to add art to the department to enhance the waiting areas. Art has been shown to improve patient experience and create a more relaxing environment.
- The group continues to review suggestions from the suggestion boxes, discussing and determining possible solutions.
- Advisors assisted in updating the ADCP "New Patient Information Package" to include instructions on how to share a compliment or concern.
- For the first time, Tricia Lesnick, Manager of the Group Health Trust Fund, attended a Council meeting to discuss their upcoming "Check a Boobie – Win a Bunkie" campaign. This campaign aims to generate funds for a new mammography unit and raise awareness, encouraging women to book their screenings. The Council appreciated the importance of the partnership between the two organizations in creating impactful community campaigns. There was a robust discussion during the meeting, allowing everyone to share their feedback, which led to the campaign's tagline being changed to "The Breast Health Bunkie Lottery" with a secondary tagline added: "Book your Mammogram".

- Advisors began the term with personalized tours of the Emergency Department, led by Sharon Abrams. This was greatly beneficial, allowing Advisors to ask questions, understand the layout, and gain insight into the department's inner workings.
- The ED Triage Redesign project is well underway and awaiting funding approval from the Ministry of Health. With the assistance of the Mental Health and Addictions PFAC, Advisors will actively contribute feedback throughout this multi-year project, aiming to create an efficient and safe triage area that ensures infection prevention, control, safety, and smooth patient flow.
- Members of the council formed a group to provide community education about the process from calling 911 to arriving at the ED. Through collaboration between Advisors, communications, and



other community partners, a poster was developed and distributed throughout the community, offering detailed information about each step, from the Central Ambulance Communication Centre to arrival at Sault Area Hospital's Emergency Department.

- The Council received a comprehensive presentation on the Patient & Family Compliment & Complaint Process to better understand its workings. Advisors were very pleased with the process and were encouraged to advocate for it.
- Over the summer, Advisors will work on producing a new Zero Tolerance Violence Poster, which will be displayed in the Emergency Department and eventually throughout the hospital. Additionally, Advisors will investigate alternatives to ensure immunocompromised patients are not placed in the general public waiting room.

- Council members were invited to participate with the ED PFAC members in the ED Triage Redesign project virtual walk-through and provide their feedback to the Project Management group.
- During Council meetings, as well as through individual ad-hoc requests, work was done on the Crisis Services Pathway process improvement project.
- Council received a presentation on the Sexual Assault Care Centre/Partner Assault Clinic to better understand the processes and services available to patients.

- The Community Closet is up and running with a great supply of seasonal clothing, thanks to the invaluable help from our SAH Volunteers. In April 2022, this Council initiated the project as a donation program aimed at enriching the lives of patients and their families and enhancing the patient experience. This initiative has since evolved into the Community Closet, nestled within the heart of 1C, which now caters to all patients in need of seasonally appropriate clothing upon discharge, irrespective of department or stay duration. As Linda Bernard, Patient and Family Advisor and volunteer, rightly observes, "It's good to have clothing there for them if they need it, for the whole hospital."
- The Patient, Family and Caregiver Declaration of Values originated from this council and had been a work in progress for many years. Now that these Values have been officially launched, the next steps are to fully embed them within the organizations, complementing our iCcare Values in all the work we do.



• The "Doing Death Better" initiative that was original proposed by an Advisors with the intent to help provide increased compassion and support for those who've experienced loss at SAH. The project has seen some "quick wins" with the development of Compassionate Care Passes (visitor parking pass for the family member who experienced the loss) as well as condolence cards so that staff have something on hand to acknowledge the patient's family. Next steps will see this become a lean yellow belt process improvement project to determine what can be done with staff and patients and families to improve the experience.


